President's Report January 2025

Tech Expansion

Our architect is developing blueprints and construction documents for the Tech expansion.

We will soon be offering Drone Technology training through our Workforce Training Department. This training will begin with flight controls leading to an FAA license then proceed to drone payload operations (cameras, infrared, GIS Mapping, etc.).

With the approval of the new airport lease request, we will begin the development of the Aviation Powerplant program. This program along with our existing Aviation Airframe program will provide our students the necessary skills to earn the FAA A&P License.

Other

Legislative session begins on January 14, 2025. Our big push at the beginning of the session is approval of the supplemental appropriation bill. This bill will allow the Coordinating Board to fully fund our actual performance in the past year. As you recall, our initial funding is based on an estimate, this bill will provide us with additional dollars. I have attached a document that lists TACC official Legislative Priorities.

Also worth noting, Governor Abbott has instructed all state colleges and universities of a mandatory tuition/fee freeze for 2025-2027. We were not planning on tuition increase so no impact to our college is anticipated.


Bond Funding

SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS REQUEST

Advocate for a supplemental appropriations request for the current biennium (FY 2024-2025), fully supporting the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board's final recommendation. This funding will:

- Reinforce the outcomes-based funding model established by House Bill 8, granting more Texans the opportunity to earn credentials of value.
- Enable institutions to sustain real-time progress and deliver measurable results that drives economic growth.

FORMULA FUNDING FOR FY 2026-2027

Support the formula funding recommendation made by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board for public junior colleges for the next biennium. This critical investment will:

- Empower institutions to adapt to the evolving needs of students and alignment with the state's expanding workforce.
- Solidify Texas community colleges as statewide leaders in affordable and highquality education.

INCLUSION OF PRIVATE INSTITUTIONS IN PERFORMANCE TIER

Amend the State Funding Performance Tier of House Bill 8 to include students who transfer to one of Texas' private or independent institutions of higher education after completing 15 semester credit hours at a public junior college. This adjustment will:

- Ensure the outcomes-based funding model reflects and recognizes multiple student success pathways.
- Foster stronger transfer pathways, expanding opportunities for students to seamlessly continue their education across all types of higher education institutions.

2025 LEGISLATIVE FOCUS AREAS

SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS REQUEST

Advocate for a supplemental appropriations request for the current biennium (FY 2024-2025), fully supporting the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board's final recommendation. This funding will reinforce the outcomes-based model, enabling institutions to sustain real-time progress and deliver measurable results for Texas students and the workforce.

FULL FUNDING FOR THE NEXT BIENNIUM

Support the formula funding recommendation made by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board for public junior colleges for the next biennium (FY 2026-2027). This investment will empower institutions to adapt to the evolving needs of students and the workforce, solidifying Texas community colleges as leaders in providing accessible, high-quality education statewide.

INCLUDING PRIVATE INSTITUTION TRANSFERS IN STATE FUNDING METRICS

Amend the State Funding Performance Tier to include students who transfer to one of Texas' private or independent institutions of higher education after completing 15 semester credit hours at a public junior college. This adjustment ensures the model fully reflects and recognizes multiple student success transfer pathways.

CONTINUE TO SCALE WORKFORCE PARTNERSHIPS

Support the continued funding and coordinating of the state's workforce grant programs for community college students. This would include grant programs such as the Texas Reskilling & Upskilling through Education (TRUE) initiative, Lone Star Workforce for the Future, Skills Development Fund, and Jobs & Education for Texans (JET).

STATE AGENCY WORKFORCE CREDENTIALS

Expand the successful credentialing program established in the 88th Texas Legislative Session, which allows the Department of Information Resources to partner with community colleges for expedited agency employment. Advocate for expanding this initiative to other state agencies, creating new opportunities for students and addressing critical workforce needs across the state.

IMPROVE ACCESS TO NURSING CLINICAL ROTATION SLOTS

Support expanding and protecting clinical training opportunities for nursing students in community colleges across Texas. Implement recommendations from the Texas Healthcare Workforce Task Force report, such as collaboration and resource sharing among educational institutions, healthcare providers, and state agencies to enhance training capacity and efficiency.

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
